## Quilt Concert \#3

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Quilt Concert is a collaborative project between Cassandra of The (Not So) Dramatic Life and Lissa of Lovingly Lissa. This quilt uses foundation paper piecing to create traditional and traditionally inspired star block set in a field of negative space

Skill Level: Confident Beginner
Printing: This pattern requires printing of the foundation paper piecing templates. Always print templates at $100 \%$ or "actual size." Use Adobe Acrobat Reader for best results. The free download of this program is available here: https://get.adobe.com/reader/

Finished Quilt Size: 60"x 72"

## All Seam allowances are 1/4"

## Glossary:

FPP: Foundation Paper Piecing
WOF: Width of Fabric
Right Side: The "pretty" side of the fabric that you will want facing out when the quilt is finished. Wrong Side: The back of the fabric that will touch the batting and won't be seen when the quilt is complete.

## Construct Quilt Unit A

1. Gather all Unit A background pieces and Block 9 blocks featuring fabric B (two blocks), fabric C (one block), and fabric F (one block). Arrange the segments as shown. (Figure 1)


Pressing Note: Press seam allowances towards background fabric pieces when possible. When this is not possible, press seam allowances open or to the side of your choice.
2. Stitch the following Unit A components together as shown in Figure 2.

- Background A-3 to one Block 9 featuring Fabric B to A-4
- A-5 to one Block 9 featuring Fabric C to $\mathrm{A}-6$
- One Block 9 featuring Fabric B to A-7 to one Block 9 featuring Fabric F.

3. Stitch row A-2 to Row A-3/4 to Row A-5/6 to Row A-7. (Figure 3)

4. Stitch Background piece A-1 to the previously stitched A components to complete Unit A. (Figure 4)

## Construct Quilt Unit B

5. Gather all Unit B background pieces, the Block 2 (Crossed Canoe) featuring fabrics B and C, Block 6 (Perpetual Motion), and one Block 9 featuring fabric E. Arrange the segments as shown. (Figure 5)

6. Stitch the following unit B components together as shown in Figure 6.

- Block 2 featuring Fabrics B and C to Background component B-2
- B-3 to Block 6
- B-4 to one Block 9 featuring Fabric E to B-5

7. Stitch Row B-2 to Row B-3 to Row B-4/5. (Figure 7)

8. Stitch Background Piece B-1 to the previously stitched B components to complete Unit B. (Figure 8)

## Construct Quilt Unit C

9. Gather all Unit C background pieces, Block 3 (Small Business), and Block 9 blocks featuring fabric B (two blocks) and fabric C (one block). Arrange the segments as shown. (Figure 9)

10. Stitch the following components together as shown in Figure 10.

- Background C-2 to one Block 9 featuring Fabric B
- $\mathrm{C}-7$ to one Block 9 featuring Fabric B
- C-8 to one Block 9 featuring Fabric C
- C-5 to Block 3 to C-6

11. Stitch the following components together as shown in Figure 11.

- $\mathrm{C}-1$ to the $\mathrm{C}-2$ Unit to $\mathrm{C}-3$
-The C-7 Unit to the C-8 Unit


12. Stitch the C-1/2/3 Unit to the C-7/8 Unit to C-4. (Figure 12)

13. Stitch the C-1/2/3/7/8/4 components to the C-5/6 components to complete Unit C. (Figure 13)

## Construct Quilt Unit D

14. Gather all Unit D background pieces, Block 5 (Guiding Star), Block 7 (Lucky Star), and one Block 9 featuring fabric D. Arrange the segments as shown. (Figure 14)

15. Stitch the following components together as shown in Figure 15.

- D-1 to Block 5
-D-2 to the Block 9 featuring Fabric D
- Block 7 to D-3

16. Stitch Unit D-2 to Unit D-3 to D-4. (Figure 16)

17. Stitch Unit D-2/3/4 to D-5. (Figure 7)
18. Stitch Unit D-1 to Unit D-2/3/4/5 to complete Unit D. (Figure 18)

## Construct Quilt Unit E

19. Gather all Unit E background pieces, Block 8 (Flying Saucer), Block 1 (Pinwheel), and one Block 9 featuring fabric C. Arrange the segments as shown. (Figure 19)

20. Stitch the following components as shown in figure 20.

- E-1 to Block 8 to E-2
- One Block 9 featuring Fabric C to E-3
- E-4 to Block 1 to E-5

## Construct Quilt Unit F

23. Gather all Unit F background pieces, two of Block 2 (Crossed Canoes) featuring Fabrics C and D, and Block 4 (Wheel of Fortune). Arrange the segments as shown. (Figure 23)
24. Stitch the following components together as shown in figure 24.

- F-1 to one Block 2 to F-2
-F-3 to one Block 2
- F-5 to Block 4 to F-6

## Finish Constructing the Quilt Top

27. Gather Units A-F. Arrange the units as shown. (Figure 27)

## Finishing

Materials for finishing the Quilt
Backing: $4-3 / 4$ yards 40 " wide fabric or 2 yards wide back fabric.
Binding: $1 / 2$ yard fabric
31. Carefully remove the paper from all foundation paper pieced blocks.
32. Assemble backing if you are not using a wide back fabric. Cut a $4-3 / 4$ yard length of fabric in half crosswise to create two 85-1/2" pieces. Trim the selvage edge on one side of each piece, then sew these panels together lengthwise along the trimmed selvage edge to create a backing piece measuring approximately $85-1 / 2 " \times 80$ ". This backing size will be large enough for most longarm machines.
33. If quilting by hand or domestic machine, layer the backing, batting, and quilt top; baste.
34. Quilt as desired.
35. Cut seven $2-1 / 4$ "x WOF strips of fabric for the binding. Stitch the strips together into one continuous piece. Fold and press the strip in half lengthwise. Machine stitch the binding to the front of the quilt. Finish the binding by hand or machine as desired.
